May stares into Brexit abyss as domestic opposition mounts

- Pro-Europeans line up to trash May's Brexit plans.
- Sterling falls on fears of "no deal", domestic turmoil.
- EU sources: We need clarity by Wednesday night.
- UK source: breakthrough unlikely this week.
- Deal text is done, but May faces lots of opposition.

London.—Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit strategy came under attack from all sides yesterday, increasing the risk that her plan for leaving the EU will be voted down by parliament and thrust the United Kingdom towards a potentially chaotic "no-deal" Brexit.

In a sign that Brexit talks could go down to the wire, EU sources said

they want clarity from London by the end of tomorrow at the latest if there is to be a summit this month to approve a Brexit deal.

May's compromise plan, which seeks to maintain close trade ties with the EU in the future, is facing opposition from Brexiteers, pro-Europeans, the Northern Irish party that props up her govern-

ment, and even some of her own ministers.

"I think it's the worst of all worlds," former education minister Justine Greening, who supported staying in the EU in the 2016 Brexit referendum, told BBC radio, adding that she did not think there was any chance it could get through parliament. **See Inside.**
