Palma.—Almost every beach and cove in Santanyí has been decimated by Storm Gloria. The Minister of Public Administration & Modernity, Isabel Castro, the Insular Councillor of Promoció Econòmica i Desenvolupament Local, Jaume Alzamora and the Insular Councillor of Hisenda i Funció Pública, Josep Lluís Colom have vis-

ited the coastline, where 12 points of destruction have been identified. The Mayor of the town, Maria Pons, was also part of the tour which included the beaches of the Natural Park of Mondragó.

The storm damage is not confined to the coastline, the Caló d'en Busquets road was also partly destroyed.

Haggis is growing in popularity, and not just in Scotland

● One of the biggest importers is Spain, says new research.

London.—Carried high by the cook on a silver platter behind a kilted piper at formal dinners, the haggis is the essential dish for anyone celebrating the birthday of Scotland's national poet, Robert Burns, yesterday.

Now the spicy meat is more popular than ever, with exports up 136% over the past decade with sales to faraway places such as Hong Kong and Ghana as well as across Europe. Burns, who died aged only 37, is celebrated by devotees around the world whose Address to a Haggis extolling the "Great chieftain o' the pudding-race" is recited by a knife-wielding orator at the start of The biggest importers of haggis are Ireland, France, Spain and Hong Kong. **See Inside**

Morocco, Spain to hold talks about overlapping waters

London.—The Moroccan and Spanish foreign ministers said yesterday their countries would hold talks about overlapping areas of ocean that they both claim rights to in the North Atlantic.

The territorial waters Morocco has claimed include the coast off Western Sahara, a territory that has been contested between Morocco and the Algerian-backed Polisario Front since the Spanish colonial period ended in 1975.

Morocco's parliament passed two bills this week to give domestic legal cover to a coastal area the North African country already controls, causing concern in Spain's Canary Islands, where the government warned of overlaps with Spanish territorial waters.
